
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# **Emirates Thoracic Society Annual Meeting**



# **Riyadh World Combat Games**





This initiative aims to welcome more female athletes and increase their participation in upcoming national and international competitions.


Young and fit are two words often found together, but what happens when a seemingly healthy young individual is suddenly no healthier than a 70-year-old?

K.D. is a 20-year-old college student and the captain of the girls' basketball team. When one of her teammates falls ill with the seasonal flu, she promptly pays her a visit to check on her and assess her readiness for the upcoming basketball tournament. Although usually vigilant about her health, witnessing her teammate's illness spurred K.D. to quickly get the seasonal flu shot at the nearest clinic. Before the shot, the nurse noted a slight drop in blood pressure on K.D.'s left arm but confirmed her overall fitness. The nurse mentioned that K.D. might experience mild flu-like symptoms for a couple of days but assured her a swift recovery.

True to the nurse's word, K.D. begins to feel the symptoms of an impending flu. Nevertheless, she persists in adhering to her routine of gym training and basketball practice. As the week progresses, K.D.'s symptoms intensify; she observes night sweats and chills, and upon visiting the now bustling gym, her teammates comment on her significant weight loss.

On the treadmill, K.D. maintains her usual pace when she suddenly feels her right leg go weak, leading to a collapse. Teammates quickly rush to her side, noting her incoherence and the numbness on the right side of her face. An ambulance is called, and K.D. is rushed to the emergency room where it is discovered that the blood pressure on her right arm is drastically higher than that on her left – where a pulse is barely detected. K.D. is presenting with symptoms of a stroke. She undergoes an immediate brain CT scan which confirms the stroke, but her diagnosis is still unclear, so a CT angiography is done, along with her blood workup. She is then treated with thrombolytic therapy and admitted overnight.

It is not until the morning rounds that the rheumatologist visits K.D. and clarifies her diagnosis. The CT angiogram revealed stenosis at the aortic arch, and her ESR was elevated. He explained the crucial role of glucocorticoids and methotrexate in maintaining remission and stressed the importance of regular follow-up visits to prevent complications of her condition.



# BASED ON A TRUE STORY


During our internal medicine rotation, my colleagues and I were assigned to an elderly patient. A cough, fatigue and some common symptoms were apparent as we spent about 15 minutes with him. After taking complete history, and performing an entire respiratory and cardiovascular examination, the nurse walked into the room.

"Where are your masks?" she said... Visibly confused, we stared at each other as the nurse shuffled us out and gave us some context our patient conveniently missed. He was an ACTIVE Tuberculosis case!





SHINING THE LIGHT ON UOS ALUMNI AROUND THE GLOBE

Batch 2021 graduate Abdulla Nidal is currently an Orthopedic Surgery resident at Rashid Hospital. He shares his story under the spotlight:

### Did you face any obstacles in your journey to residency?

It may seem arbitrary to define "obstacles," for in the realm of medicine, hardships became our constant companions from the moment we embarked on this journey eight years ago. Yet, if we narrow our focus and only consider adversities as part of the definition, we find the most formidable obstacle in residency is the profound quest to discover what we truly want and whether medicine is IT, in the first place.

# What was the most surprising thing about your post-graduate journey?

Throughout my years at university, I strived to maintain control over my life choices and insisted that every decision I made contributed to a rich and meaningful journey. However, entering residency unveiled a startling truth – you often have a minimal role in shaping your own path. Initially, I applied for General Surgery as my first choice and received an overwhelming nine interview invitations. But destiny had other plans, and I found myself accepted into Orthopedic Surgery, my second choice and a more competitive specialty, with just one interview. Surprisingly, it was only now that I discovered the truth of the universal adage, "You plan, I plan, and Allah does what He planned."

### What do you miss most about university life?

Residency sometimes comes with a bittersweet nostalgia for the days of university – the cherished memories, the mentors who sculpted your professional persona, and the classes skipped over cups of Karak with the second family that you probably have drifted away from now. The yearning for those simpler times is perfectly natural and one must battle through it. So, cherish it while you can now because you will miss it all, really.

# What is one thing you would do differently if you could go back in time?

Entering university, I had a clear vision of achieving work-life balance. I held leadership positions in various student organizations; I was president of the MSA, PAC, and RnD. I orchestrated a year of memorable events and founded initiatives like Project Butterfly and P2P of PAC, which left an enduring legacy almost half a decade later. However, I failed to recognize that true balance extends beyond merely filling your time with activities unrelated to studying. It involves embracing diversions that are not tethered to the world of medicine. In hindsight, I would have taken a different approach – nurturing a hobby or interest group outside the realm of healthcare to ensure my life remained multifaceted. Do that and find your escape before you're in need of a refuge.


### What advice would you give students following in your footsteps?

In residency, you gain more privilege and power in patient care. However, we all know, that with great power comes great responsibility. The weight of responsibility often becomes burdensome. As we move forward, I encourage all of you to distinguish between caring for others and caring for yourself.

Should you ever lose your passion, do not hesitate to forge a new path. This is not "giving up" but "leveling up" to a career where you can make an even more profound impact on the world. Remember, we were expected to decide the course of our entire future at an age when we could not even sign a legal document or safely operate a car.







